Winter Reminders

The Winter Parking ordinance is in effect until March 31st. Parking on city streets (this includes the shoulders) is not allowed between 10 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. Citations may be

issued. Please remove your garbage cans from the roadside as soon as possible. Keep in mind that snowplows can throw snow, ice, and debris 12 to 15 feet on average. Park your vehicles and keep other personal items off the street as far as possible to reduce the likelihood of damage.

Please DO NOT push or blow the snow from your driveway and sidewalk into or across the city street or into your neighbor's yard. If you have a fire hydrant near your property, please clear snow for 2-3 feet around it so the hydrant may be quickly accessed in case of an emergency.

No Rabies Clinic

The city will NOT hold a rabies clinic this year. Dogs need to be licensed by February 29th; fees double starting March 1st.

Proof of rabies vaccination is required when obtaining the dog license. Fees are \$5 for a neutered or spayed dog, and \$10 for an intact dog.

city, and he and councilmembers will be present to answer your questions.

Spring Soccer



Utah will hold a Democratic and Republican Presidential Primary Election on Tuesday, March 3, 2020. The Utah Democratic Party allows all voters, regardless of party affiliation, to vote in its presidential primary election. The Utah Republican Party allows only voters affiliated with the Republican (GOP) Party to vote in its presidential primary election.

Justice Court adds Online Payment Option

The Richmond Justice Court has implemented an online payment option for paying fines. Fines may be paid at the Richmond City Office (90 S 100 W) during business hours (9:00 am to 5:00 pm, M-F) or via an online portal (Instant Payments).

You will need to enter your citation or court case number from the Richmond Justice Court. Online payments are through the <u>Instant Payments portal</u>.

Census 2020

You'll be receiving information on the 2020 Census starting in March. The census form takes about 10 minutes to fill out. This year, you can reply online or by mail. Richmond Library staff are trained to help people fill out the census online, and the library has dedicated computers and a hotspot for people to use. Once the form is submitted online, all personal information is removed.

Data from the census are used in many ways. The following pages describe how the statistics are used to aid cities, schools, and so much more.

CENSUS 101: WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

The 2020 Census is closer than you think! Here's a quick refresher of what it is and why it's essential that everyone is counted.

Everyone counts.

The census counts every person living in the United States once, only once, and in the right place.



It's in the Constitution.

The U.S. Constitution mandates that everyone in the country be counted every 10 years. The first census was in 1790.

It's about fair representation.


Every 10 years, the results of the census are used to reapportion the House of Representatives, determining how many seats each state gets.



It's about \$675 billion.

Article 1

Section 2



The distribution of more than \$675 billion in federal funds, grants, and support to states, counties, and communities are based on census data.

That money is spent on schools, hospitals, roads, public works, and other vital programs.



It's about redistricting.

After each decade's census, state officials redraw the boundaries of the congressional and state legislative districts in their states to account for population shifts.



Completing the census is mandatory: it's a way to participate in our democracy and say "I COUNT!"



Census data are being used all around you.



Residents use the census to support community initiatives involving legislation, quality-of-life, and consumer advocacy.




Local governments use the census for public safety and emergency preparedness.

Real estate

developers use the

census to build new homes and revitalize old neighborhoods.

Businesses use census data to decide where to build factories, offices, and stores, which create jobs.



Your privacy is protected.

It's against the law for the Census Bureau to publicly release your responses in any way that could identify you or your household.

By law, your responses cannot be used against you and can only be used to produce statistics.

In 2020, you will be able to respond to the census online.
